Brownstone After School Program

For students between the ages of 5 and 12, childhood should be a fascinating journey full of discovery, nourished in a way that sustains his or her positive development. Homelessness often delays a child's academic progress by more than a year due to school transfers and frequent absences. At the Brownstone program, we address these challenges by:

- Offering an enriched curricula and homework assistance
- Focusing on the individual needs of each child
- Engaging parents and public school teachers as partners in the education process
- Providing enrichment activities such as field trips, swimming and photography classes
- Partnering with outside cultural organizations, such as Mad Science and Alvin Ailey Dance Company, for learning opportunities through the arts
- Helping students build confidence and social skills
- Bridging the summer learning gap through HFH Summer Camps and intensive summer programming

FutureLink After School Program

Entering the shelter system during adolescence can be an overwhelming experience for a teenager. All the fears and uncertainties of high school are magnified when one does not have a permanent home to return to at the end of the day. FutureLink was established so that young adults between the ages of 13 and 18 can discover their full potential and lead productive lives. FutureLink strives to:

- Empower teenagers to break through educational passivity
- Help students explore multiple academic avenues by maintaining a low student to teacher ratio
- Increase students' technological and cultural literacy
- Provide opportunities for community involvement
- Offer practical life strategies, such as conflict resolution and career planning
- Preserve a teaching style that promotes collective scholastic achievement and encourages the exchange of ideas
- Inspire students to become bold leaders

HFH K-12 Enrichment Programs, including HFH Summer Camps, help students overcome the stigma of homelessness by encouraging them to aim high, not simply to catch up.
